2001 JOHN ABBOT AWARD RECIPIENT - LEROY C. KOEHN

I would like to thank the membership for the honor of the John Abbot Award. I am now part of a very prestigious group of Lepidopterists who have been the recipients of the John Abbot Award. I was told that my efforts on behalf of the Society were the principle reasons for this honor. I enjoyed having the opportunity to be part of this Society and to have shared in the experience that is the Southern Lepidopterists' Society.



I am a Charter Member of the Society and I was involved from the very beginning when it was established in 1976. I was living in Virginia at the time and the founder, Dave Baggett, asked me to serve as the field coordinator for the state of Virginia. I agreed and served until 1981 when I relocated to Ohio. I once again relocated to the south in 1987, this time to Florida and in 1988 I was asked to take over as newsletter editor. Newsletters were not being produced and there was no real organized effort to move the Society in any direction. As a result, the Society had almost faded into obscurity. There were over 140 dues paying members and most wanted the Society to be active and succeed. They also wanted the field reports that were one of the original blocks in the foundation of the Society. With the help of Tom Neal and Jeffrey Slotten, we set out to make the Society active and to give it direction. Newsletters were published on time, several field meetings were organized and held each year and beginning in 1990, an annual meeting was held. Officers were elected and the Society began to grow. By the fall of 1991, there were over 230 members. As a result of serving as Editor, I met lots of people, learned all about computers and computer programs, and I

learned to tolerate grumpy old men and clearly understood that I would eventually become one. I also learned to type at a high rate of speed with two fingers and give the printer one when necessary. But above all, I made many friends,

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shared many an interesting night around a sheet with others who where as excited about moths as me and knew as many bad jokes as I did! I also learned to push people to get things done and not be bashful of asking. It was a great journey and I truly enjoyed the time that I served. It was truly rewarding.

Sadly, in November of 1991, I moved back to Ohio. This was a difficult time for the Society. There was conflict from within that prevented the officers from serving the Society. Then in 1992 came the USFW raids on several collectors and the Society was awash in turmoil. The principles that the Society were founded on came under fire and the collecting of butterflies came under attack. As a result the membership began to dwindle away. My stay in Ohio was short and in January of 1994 I moved south once again to Greenwood, Mississippi. Although I did not serve the Society was suddenly without leadership as the Chairman/Editor abruptly resigned. I remember the night that Jeff Slotten called me and asked me if I would help him as he was seriously concerned for the future of the Society. I have always had a place in my heart for the Society, so I volunteered to serve as Editor once again. With the willing help of Drew Hildebrandt, John Calhoun, James Taylor, and Bill Russell, we put the Society back on track, and gave it direction. The most difficult task, however, was increasing the membership. A difficult and frustrating task that Drew Hildebrandt met head on. In January of 1992 there were 234 members and in January of 1996 there were just 88 members. I was shocked to learn that we had lost more than 60% of the membership. Jeff, Drew and I sent letters and e-mails, made numerous telephone calls and did whatever it took to get the membership.

We organized and held field meetings and the annual meeting, published an informative Newsletter and encouraged field workers to report their finding. Just as we once again began to grow, I did it again and moved to Kentucky in 2000. The good news is that the Society finally got a true editor with Barry Lombardini. Even though I no longer serve the Society, I still keep in touch. The Society is like an old friend. I may be gone, but you always remember your friend.

I now live in Georgetown, Kentucky, and I currently serve the Society of Kentucky Lepidopterists as, what else, Newsletter Editor. My wife Betty and I enjoy our new home. Betty is a native of Kentucky and she has family in the Corbin and Barbourville areas of the state. My wife has endured much, living with a Lepidopterist.

I want to thank all of you who helped me and encouraged me along the way. For those who endured those greasy steak and eggs meals at the Waffle House, the endless streams of jokes (I mean some BAD jokes), the frustrations and the successes, the highs and the lows, some great collecting, the swarms of mosquitos, those delightful sand burs, and above all, the friendship, thank you for a memorable time.

CONGRATULATIONS LEROY: The Society Membership congratulate Leroy Koehn for being named the recipient of the 2001 John Abbot Award. As noted above, Leroy has been a mainstay in the Southern Lepidopterists' Society and has brought the Society through some bad times. We wish Leroy all the best in his move to Kentucky and his new job as Newsletter Editor for the Society of Kentucky Lepidopterists. Don't be a stranger, Leroy [Knowing Leroy, I don't think that he will (The Editor)].

DESTRUCTION OF A GOOD COLLECTION SITE

It is on a rather sad note that we discovered the loss of one of our favorite *Schinia* and *Hesperia* collecting sites in the Williston area of Levy County, Florida, affectionately known as "the bunker". David Fine, Robert Beiriger, Mark Walker and Leroy Koehn were planning to light for moths there, on the night of October 12, during our North Central Florida collecting trip. We stopped at one of our favorite collecting sites near an old cinder block building (See Color Insert) that housed gas transmission line monitoring equipment along SR 121 south west of Williston. Behind the building were several hundred acres of turkey oaks and Scrub Pine flat woods. Much to our surprise, the entire area had been converted into what we all needed, a peanut farm (See Color Insert). This field was a good mix of grass, flowers with an over-story of mature turkey oaks and it is sad to lose such a great habitat.

Anyone who has ever gone collecting after a Southern Lepidopterists' Society meeting in Gainesville has visited this site. When it was said, we'd meet at the bunker, most knew where to go. Over 20 species of *Schinia* and *Heliothis* moths could be found at the site as well as several butterflies including *Hesperia attalus, H. meskei*, and an odd looking *Satyrium calanus* that appeared to be a southern version of *S. calanus falacer*. A brief idea of how good a habitat this was can be found by looking in the collections of several members of the Southern Lepidopterists' Society. Without these records, you might never know what a great area it once was.

If we can not save the habitat, we can not save the species. This is one area that will be missed.

SIBLING SPECIES SYNANTHEDON KATHYAE DUCK. & EICH. AND

SYNANTHEDON ALLERI (ENGEHL.) IN SOUTHEAST LOUISIANA

Abstract: The occurrence, flight periods, and method of differentiating the species Synanthedon kathyae Duck. & Eich. and S. alleri (Engehl.) in southeast Louisiana are given and discussed.

Key Words: clearwings, flight traps, Florida, light traps, Louisiana, moth, pheromones, sesiidae, Synanthedon.




Fig. 1. Phenology of vellow and black form of Synanthedon kathyae Duck. & Eich., March-July, n = 542, and brown and orange form of Synanthedon alleri (Engehl.), August-October, n = 46, captured at sec. 24, T6, SR12E, 4.2 mi. NE Abita Springs, Louisiana, 1982-2001.

These two apparent sibling species have been collected in Louisiana since 1982 using flight traps, light traps, and pheromone traps, *S. kathyae* (n = 1057), *S. alleri* (n = 63). Both species are newly reported as occurring in Louisiana. Brown & Mizell (1993) and Eichlin and Duckworth (1988) both listed the known range of S. alleri encompassing portions of the states: Florida, Georgia, Alabama and Mississippi. Brown & Mizell (1993) did not include S. kathyae in their list of sesiidae occurring in Florida.




Fig. 2. Phenology of black forms of: Synanthedon kathyae Duck. & Eich., April-July, n = 515, and Synanthedon alleri (Engehl.), August-October, N=17, taken at sec. 24, T6, SR12E, 4.2 mi. NE Abita Springs, St. Tammany Parish, Louisiana, 1982-2001.

I began investigating the entirely black color phase of *alleri*, and through years of continuous collecting have discovered the presence of kathyae and some interesting facts regarding these two species. Both species are remarkably similar in appearance, but do not readily respond to the same pheromone attractants nor do they have the same flight periods in southeast Louisiana. S. alleri was not responsive to all various commercially available pheromones used over the life of this study, except the more recently available raspberry clearwing pheromone, which vielded a small quantity of specimens during 2001. About two-thirds of the *alleri* recorded here were captured in flight traps and uv light traps. Both species have black color phases. The flight periods are depicted in Fig.1 and 2 for the two species, *kathyae*, a spring species, and *alleri*, a fall species in Louisiana.

The color of *alleri* is described in Eichlin and Duckworth (1988) as having a brown black ground color with orange markings on thorax, legs, and usually on dorsal abdominal segments four and five and ventrally on segments four through seven. These authors state: "Patterns that are orange in alleri are yellow on kathyae ... " and "A few specimens (alleri) are nearly or entirely brown black". They state the basic ground color of kathyae is blue black.

In describing alleri coloration, Engelhardt (1946) used the terms "rusty black", dull black", and "golden yellow".

Sharp et al. (1978) and Sharp and Eichlin (1979) reported males of *alleri* were captured in nearly all months of the vear in Florida. Brown & Mizell (1993) reported adults of *alleri* from March to December in Florida. I have reviewed Brown's material (81 specimens) and (8 specimens) taken by H. Weems and C. Stevens in the Florida State Collection of Arthropods (FSCA), and confirmed all are indeed *alleri* collected in 12 Florida counties. There were no kathyae among this series of alleri (seven specimens are totally black) collected from 1970-87, encompassing the months February through December, though 71% were taken during the months April and May, and most were taken in the eight mid-panhandle counties. Surprisingly, there are no fall records among the Florida panhandle specimens (counties: Bay, Calhoun, Gadsden, Jackson, Liberty, Wakulla, Walton, and Washington), though spring and fall records are from peninsular counties of Citrus and Hillsborough, the latter having specimens taken in nine months. Labels on Brown's specimens indicate pheromones EZA/EZOH, EZOH, EZA/ZZA were used. S. kathyae males respond to the opposite stereoisomer (ZZA).

In southeastern Louisiana, alleri and kathyae appear to be univoltine, and alleri does not make an appearance till mid-August in Louisiana. The type series of 10 specimens of alleri listed by Engelhardt (1946), collected in the vicinity of Mobile, Alabama, were taken "late August, September, and October 1931-32", the same flight period

found in the present study for Louisiana. Eichlin and Duckworth (1988) listed the range of kathyae from Nova Scotia southward along the eastcoast over several states to South Carolina. S. kathyae has been reported in recent years by Knudson and Bordelon (1999) from Texas.

In Louisiana, most of the alleri specimens recorded in this study were collected in flight traps and ultraviolet light traps, while most of the kathyae were taken using pheromone traps, with 10% taken in ultraviolet light traps. I did not resolve this alleri vs. kathyae matter myself, until I degreased over 500 specimens and was able to discern the subtle, but quite apparent differences in coloration of the two species. After degreasing, the species were easily separated by color and the specimen dates were plotted on Fig. 1. Dates of capture of black specimens were plotted on Fig. 2, and subsequent comparison of the black forms of the two species indicated a somewhat flat black color for alleri vs. subtle, not always discernable blue-black for kathyae. In the Abita Springs population, the black forms accounted for nearly 50% in *kathyae*, and nearly 30% in *alleri*. I have no explanation as to why it appears there are no spring specimens of alleri captured in Louisiana despite 32 year of continuous year-round light trapping, and pheromone use for over 20 years in southeast Louisiana by this author, and despite this area being at a similar latitude as the panhandle of Florida locations. Had this study been done with the Florida panhandle data, one would have concluded alleri was a univoltine spring species.

WHO WAS JOHN ABBOT?

The Southern Lepidopterists' Society periodically honors a lepidopterist with the John Abbot Award. But does the membership know who John Abbot was? John Abbot was an 18th century naturalist and artist born in England in 1751. His interests as a youth were in collecting and drawing insects but this was not considered to be a profession that one could earn one's living, and consequently his father encouraged him to study law in the family tradition.

At the age of 18, John Abbot was employed in his father's law firm but this was certainly not to his liking. Therefore, in 1773 because of his recognized talent as a watercolor artist, the Royal Society in London invited him to travel to Virginia in the New World to collect and paint the flora and fauna of the area. A year later due to the threat of the Revolutionary War, Abbot moved to Burke County, Georgia. It is here in Georgia that Abbot spent the remainder of his life supplying collectors and naturalists with specimens and drawings of insects. He once remarked that war only interfered with his work and it (war) was the "mad and destructive ambition of the rulers of the world". Of course he was referring to the Revolutionary War and the War of 1812. Many of John Abbot's watercolors were published in 1797 (London) in a book entitled "The natural history of the rarer lepidoptera insects of Georgia". One of his rarer insects is today known as the American Painted Lady (Vanessa virginiensis) then referred to as La Belle Dame D'Amerique (Papilio huntera). It is believed that John Abbot painted over 5,000 watercolor drawings of Georgia insects during his lifetime. John Abbot died in 1840 in Bulloch County, Georgia.

LEROY - BAD LUCK OR JUST FATE?

Robert Beiriger and colleagues were going to meet Leroy for a night of mothing on October 13th, but he was not to be found. Below is an edited version of Leroy's excuse.

"I was headed back down Route 24 from Gainesville to put out a light trap at Gulf Hammock. I had spoken with Robert Beiriger on my cell phone and then called Dave Fine and finalized plans to light for moths and locations to set out my other two traps. As I began to dial Robert's cell number again, I came to the traffic light at Route 24 and US 27 in Archer. I turned my attention from the cell phone to the traffic light as it turned red. I came to a stop and began to dial Robert's number, when a pickup truck failed to negotiate the turn from US 27 onto Route 24. The movement of the truck caught my eye and just as I looked up, it struck the left front corner of my van. It was not a hard hit, however, it was enough to activate the air bag in my steering wheel. I had my hand over the steering wheel while dialing Robert's cell number. As the air bag deployed, it slammed my hand with the cell phone into the left side of my face. The impact was stunning. I was dazed and bleeding severely from my mouth and nose. I remember little other than someone stuffing cloth or gauze into my mouth and was taken to a hospital in Gainesville. When I awoke during the night, I was still in the ER. The impact of the cell phone had caused a gash inside my mouth that required 16 stitches

to close and I had received a mild concussion. My head ached and rang like a bell. My face was swollen and my nose was black. I was discharged Monday morning. I had the air bag on the van repaired at a Chevy dealer in Gainesville at a cost of \$1100. The damage to the front of the van was not all that bad. The dealer cut off the damaged part of the bumper and pulled out the fender. There was no damage to the steering and the van handled fine during the ride back to Kentucky. By the way, the young lady that hit me was 17 years old, had no drivers license or insurance. However, the father is an attorney. Outside of a sore head, a very tender mouth, and being very tired, I am okay. Or at least I think I am. Also, the Highway Patrol confiscated all of my ethyl acetate, cyanide killing jars, and all my tupperware containers with specimens that were in the van during the accident investigation. We had to drive to Ocala Florida, to pick them up and then I had to explain what I was doing with these materials and why they were in my possession. This process took almost 4 hours. We were finally on the road by 5 PM and arrived home Tuesday, October 16th, at 9AM."

Needless to say, Robert and colleagues had more fun than Leroy did Saturday night and Sunday.

During the first week of August, David Fine visited Gumbo Limbo Nature Center in Boca Raton, Palm Beach County, Florida. He found Aphrissa statira very common along with lots of Phoebis agarithae, P. philea, P. sennae, Heraclides cresphontes, Papilio polyxenes, Battus polydamas, Marpesia petreus, Siproeta stelenes, Appias drusilla, Ascia monuste, Phocides pigmalion okeechobee, Polygonus leo, Urbanus dorantes, U. proteus, Cymanenes tripunctus, Lerema accius, Heliconius chartonius, Agraulis vanillae, Dryas julia, and Composia fidilisima.

On August 11, David visited Yeehaw Juction, Oceola County, Florida and found Euphves arpa abundant on blazing star flowers. Also seen were Eurytides marcellus, Pterourus glaucus, Pterourus palamedes, Pterourus triolus, Agraulis vanillae, Atrytone logan, Calpodes ethlius, and Pyrgus oileus. He stopped at Port Mayaca and found Asterocampa clyton and A. celtus both abundant and saw Polygonia interrogationis, Limentitis archippus, and Siproeta stelenes. David managed to rear Asterocampa clyton and A. celtus from eggs collected during this visit.

David has also been rearing some Sphingids. He has reared Erinnyis alope on papaya, Xylophanes pluto on fire bush, Erinnyis ello on pointsetta, Eumorpha fasciata on primrose willow, Eumorpha labruscae on impatients, Manduca rustica on angels trumpet, Manduca sexta on tomato, Xylophanes tersa on penta, Pseudosphinx tetrio on Plumeria spp., Cocytius antaeus on Pond apple, Lapara coniferarum on slash pine, Daraspa myron on grape, and Hyles lineata.

Jeff Slotten visited Yankeetown in Levy County, Florida on the 9th of September and found Mitoura gryneus sweadneri, Panoquin panoquin, Panoquin panoquinoides, Papilio palamedes, and the dayflying moths Cosmosoma myrodora and Syntomeida epilais jucundissima. The surprising catch was two Cautethia grotei visiting eupatorium blossoms. This is either a northern extension of its range or just a couple of strays of this tiny sphingid, which is usually found in southern Florida.

Richard Boscoe collected west of Floral City, Citrus County, Florida on October 2, 2001. Skippers collected and/or observed nectaring on Liatris spp., Carphephorus spp., and Belduina spp. were Euphyes arpa, Hesperia meskei, H. attalus, Polites vibexs, Atalopedes campestris, Wallengrenia otho, Oligoris maculata, Nastra neamathla, Atrytone logan, Panoquina ocola, Urbanus proteus and U. dorantes. Richard also was able to get one Euphyes arpa to oviposite on Serenoa repens and larvae are currently feeding.

Leroy Koehn, Dave Fine, Mark Walker and Robert Beiriger visited a turkey oaks area southwest of Williston in Levy County on Oct. 12, 13, & 14. Their main interest was Schinia moths and they found these in numbers: Schinia scissoides, S. spinoseae, S. bina, S. fulleri, S. petulans, S. sordida, S. tuberculum, S. arcigera, S. rivulosa, S. saturata, S. trifascia, S. gaurae, S. sanquinea, and S. arefacta. They also collected the following moths Heliothis toralis, Rhodoecia aurantiago, Cisthene striata, C. subjecta, Neoplynes eudora, Apantesis placentia, A. nais, and Cosmosoma myrodora., Horama panthalon texana, Syntomedia ipomoeae, Estigmene acrea, Grammia virgo, Apantesis vittata, Apantesis phalerata, Eumorpa achemon, Eumorpha fasciata, Agrius cingulaus, Manduca sexta, Ceratomia catalpae, Envo lugubris, Isoparce cupressi, Xvlophanes tersa, Paonias myops, Laothoe juglandis, Hemaris thysbe, and Darapsa myron.

In two trips to Gulf Hammock over the weekend, we collected Euphyes arpa, Poanes vehl, Pyrgus communis, Amblyscirtes aesculapius, Poanes zabulon, Polites themistocles, Polites viator, Pompeius verna, Hylephila phyleus, Nastra neamathala, Asterocampa clyton, Polygonia interrogationis, Lemenitis archippus, Helicnius chartonius, Euptoieta claudia, Phyciodes texana, Phyciodes phaon, Vanessa virginiensis, Vanessa cardui, Vanessa atalanta, Precis coenia, Hermeuptychia sosybius, Battus philenor, Eurytides marcellus, Heraclides cresphontes, Pterourus. glaucus, Pterourus troilus, Pterourus palamedes, Eurema diara, Eurema lisa, Eurema nicippie, Nathalis iole, Calycopis cecrops, Styrmon melinus, and Hemiargus ceraunus.

Its been a great summer for Underwing moths (Catocala), both in terms of numbers and diversity, though there was a distinctive reduction in numbers of moths in all families in August that continued through September. What made this particularly strange was that the conditions were wetter than they had been the past couple of years, and so theoretically should have been good for the moths! October, though much drier, saw a dramatic rebound in moth numbers, with some excellent new species being recorded for the state. Records listed below are from James Adams unless otherwise specified. Other contributors include: Bill Russell (BR), Irving Finkelstein (IF), Jim Taylor (JT), Jeff Slotten (JS), Kathleen Casses (KC), Robert Clements (RC), and Maria Capolino (MC). Most records presented here represent new or interesting records (range extensions, unusual dates, uncommon species, county records, etc.) or newly identified species, mostly for NW Georgia. Records are from Calhoun, Gordon Co., GA unless otherwise specified, so any record listed without locality data is from my back porch! Ricky Patterson collected on the Mississippi Gulf coast on 14 September 2001. At Pecan, Jackson county, Euphyes berrvi was found to be relatively common (although local). A few Euphyes dion, Euphyes pilatka, and Atrytone logan logan were collected also. Almost all the skippers were found on Liatris blooms in a recently burned area, which seemed to have improved the habitat.

The following weekend, Howard and Charles Grisham joined Ricky for another collecting trip on the coast. On 21 September 2001, at the locality near Pecan, a number of Euphves berrvi were again collected, again with a few Euphyes dion, E. pilatka, and Atrytone logan logan. A short trip across the state line into Alabama did not find any Euphyes berryi, which would be a state record.

The following day (22 Sept), a different locality near Pecan was sampled and a few E. berryi were found, along with a couple of E. dion and a Parhassius m-album. Near Moss Point, Jackson county, Euphyes pilatka was collected, along with Cercyonis pegala (abbotti?). At the I-10 bridge at the Pascagoula River, Charles Grisham collected an Ervnnis funeralis, and a couple of E. pilatka were seen nectaring on Pickerel weed. At a locality in Bay St Louis, Hancock county, in a powerline cut on Hwy 43 approximately 1 mile south of I-10, several Euphyes dion, E. pilatka, Neonympha areolata, and Oligoria maculata were collected. It is interesting to note that the Euphyes dion collected here (with no salt marsh influence) are the darker specimens typically found all over Mississippi, even though this locality is only 4 miles from the type locality (salt marsh) of Euphyes bayensis.

On 23 September, the three of us collected on the Tuxachanie hiking trail in the DesSoto National Forest. There we collected Neonympha areolata (in a dry, uplands grassy pine habitat), Eurema daira daira, Nastra lherminier, and Phyciodes phaon.

The fall season was remarkably dry. In addition to a lack of hurricanes and tropical storms, there were few fronts carrying rain. Most areas in the state barely had three inches of rain for the entire season. Despite the good conditions for butterflies (at least for nectaring), this was a season highlighted by a general poverty of northward migrants. Migrant pierids, especially Eurema lisa, were in short supply, as were Hesperiidae species such as Urbanus proteus, Lerodea eufala, and Copaeodes minimus. On the plus side were the continued presence of Vanessa atalanta and V. cardui in much larger numbers than usual in the fall, and a good rebound of Danaus plexippus



numbers from the spring and summer, perhaps owing to excellent reproductive success not only here but in states to the north (as noted from migration totals in the mountains in September).

Records are for September - November 2001:

PIERIDAE:

Pontia protodice, this species was scarce all year, and the only seasonal report was of four males seen by HL in Wayne on October 21.

Colias cesonia, the first report in the state in over a decade was one seen at Weymouth Woods Sandhills Nature Preserve, Moore, on November 2 by Scott Hartley.

LYCAENIDAE:

Atlides halesus, quite late was one noted on October 20 in Chatham by HL and JP.

Parrhasius m-album, Ron Gatrelle reported one on the late date, at least for the mountain region, of October 2 in Macon.

RIODINIDAE:

Calephelis virginiensis, JP and Dave Powell counted 56, a very high state total, at a few sites in Croatan National Forest on September 9.

NYMPHALIDAE:

Vanessa cardui, good totals for the coastal area were 45 in Dare on September 8 (HL et al.) and 23 in Currituck **(COUNTY)** on September 29 (Will Cook, Randy Emmitt).

Limenitis arthemis astyanax, Will Cook reported a surprisingly late individual on November 14 in Durham. *Danaus plexippus*, by far the best count of the season was an estimated 6000 seen migrating past Bullhead Mountain in Alleghany on September 17 by James Coman.

HESPERIIDAE:

Hesperia leonardus, Will Cook had a good state count of ten in northern Moore on October 7.

Problema byssus, on September 9, JP and Dave Powell found at least 12 in Croatan National Forest in Carteret (COUNTY), near the northern edge of the species range.

Euphyes dion, an excellent state count was 40 made by HL, JP, and party in Dare on September 8.

Euphyes berryi, HL, JP, and party counted a state record 22 individuals in Dare on September 8. This is the northernmost site known for the species.

Calpodes ethlius, the only report for the year in North Carolina was of an adult at Figure Eight Island, New Hanover, on September 29 (Derb Carter).

Ed reports the following: Bordelon & I spent a week in south TX from Nov.10 - Nov.18, part of the time in company with Dale Clark and Charlie Sassine. We recorded about 95 butterfly species (including two that were seen only by Clark or Sassine). Nothing of great interest, however.

Hidalgo Co, Mission. Nov. 11 - 13: Biblis hyperia aganisa (collected by Dale Clark); Melanis pixe (over a dozen adults (mostly females) observed (some collected), in late afternoon, as they appeared to be seeking a roosting site in several Anacua trees.

Starr Co., Rio Grande City, 4 and 16 Nov. Spathelepia clonius (collected by Sassine).

Cameron Co., Santa Maria NWR 14, 15 Nov. Eurema daira lydia, Heliconius charitonius vasquezae, Dryas iulia moderata. Phocides palegon lilea, Lerodea dysaules, and the Pericopid moth, Phaelosia saucia (Bordelon & Knudson).

Cameron Co., Audubon Palm Grove, 16, 17 Nov. Lasaia sula peninsularis, Melanis pixe, Urbanus tanna (Bordelon & Knudson). Two new state records of Pyralid moths were collected at the Palm grove on the morning of Nov. 18 (Knudson). These were Hydriris ornatalis and Zamagiria laidion (both of which occur in Florida).

In the Houston area this year, both Heliconius charitonius vasquezae and Dryas iulia lydia have been seen a number of times, especially at Brazos Bend State Park. D. iulia lydia was observed in my yard as late as Dec 6.

Butterflies suffered a year of very low numbers and species diversity in general. Factors responsible for this decline are unknown but it covered the whole range of families and genera. Many species regularly observed in the state were not reported in 2001, and many common species were only seen as infrequent individuals. However, in stark contrast to this trend, several species had an exceptional year and two new state records were reported. Vanessa atalanta produced a spring flight of record proportions, apparently the largest northward migration in recent memory. Similarly, Cynthia virginiensis experienced a similar phenomenon, though with numbers considerably smaller than atalanta. Though no general northward movement was reported, Cynthia cardui was present in fair numbers late in the season, indicating that it, too, experienced a good year. Other species experiencing a good year were Epargyreus clarus, Ervnnis juvenalis, Battus philenor, Eurytides marcellus, Anthocharis midea, Celastrina neglecta, Celastrina neglectamajor (irrupting in the mountains of northern Virginia for the second year), and Hermeuptychia sosybius, being reported for the first time in northern Virginia, and in very considerable numbers. Some species experienced exceptional flights in some areas, yet were nearly absent in other areas where they are normally common. Examples were Speveria cybele and Charidryas ismeria nycteis which were both reported as unusually common in the central and western mountains, yet nearly absent in the north. Atalopedes campestris, normally not reported beyond first autumnal frost in northern Virginia, continued to emerge past this year's Oct. 10 hard frost and subsequent frosts, and flew into December, defying past trends. More interestingly, late males displayed unusual morphs indicating influence of cold weather. In these, the ventral HW expressed a variety of dark patterns and markings not seen in summer individuals.

Note, for each species the following is listed: county, location, date, reporter initials, number and means of identification indicated in parentheses. Virginia's "Independent Cities" maintain a status equivalent to counties, and are thus new records from within their boundaries are listed as "CITY".

Additional reports (Leroy Koehn submitted the following report from his trip to Big Black Mountain earlier in summer):

On 23 June 2001, Leroy Koehn and John Hyatt visited the Big Black Mountain area of Wise County and found the butterflies and moths in abundance. Along Route 160 at the foot of the mountain they found Speyeria diana, S. cvbele, Satvrium calanus falacer, Pompeius verna and Wallengrenia egermet. They ran UV lights and collected Manduca jasminearum, Dolba hyloeus, Paonias astylus, Darapsa versicolor, Haploa clymene, H. colona, H. contigua, H. lecontei, Grammia anna, Euchaetes egle, Cvcnia tenera, C. oregonensis, Catocala flebilis, C. coccinata, C. amica, C. Connubialis, and Pyrrhia expermens.

On 6,7, and 8 July 2001, Leroy Koehn and Bob Beiriger visited the Big Black Mountain area of Wise County as part of the Society of Kentucky Lepidopterists summer field meeting to Big Black Mountain in Kentucky. They operated UV lights for moths on the summit of Big Black Mountain in Virginia on Friday night 6 July. They were joined by Charles Wright of Frankfort, KY. and Bill Black of Paducah, KY. The moth collecting was excellent. Some of the better records included: Citheronia regalis, Sphingicampa bicolor, Anisota senatoria, Ceratomia catalpae, Sphinx eremitus, S. chersis, Darapsa versicolor (also common in bait traps), Sphecodina abbottii, Haploa colona, H. lecontei, Catocala innubens, C. epione, C. habilis, C. judith, C. angusi, C. obscura, C. residua, C. retecta, C.dejecta, C. nebulosa, C. subnata, C. coccinata, C. micronympha, C. connubialis, Acronicta morula, A. fragilis, and A. hamamelis.

Although a thorough search of the Big Black Mountain was attempted, there was no sign of Erora laeta. Along Route 160, Speveria diana was common, especially on blooms of milkweed.
